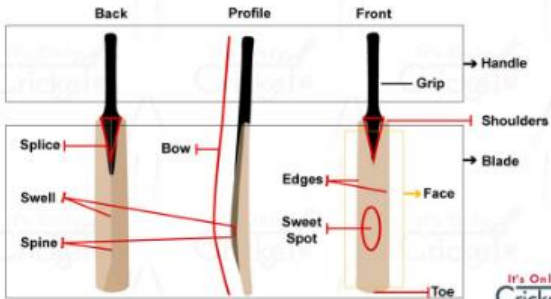




Autumn PE - Cricket



Topic	Knowledge - Children will learn	Children will be able to...	Prior Knowledge
Cricket (3 sessions)	To bowl at a target. To hold a bat correctly. To understand the basic laws of Kwik Cricket.	- Bowl a cricket ball at a target Children to use a range of targets to hit (wall, target boards). These will vary on size dependant on ability/ progress made during the lesson. Cricket stumps to ideally be used at the end to relate to the equipment used in a game. Children to look at the correct way to hold the ball. Both underarm and overarm techniques to be taught demonstrating the correct points for each delivery. - Hold a cricket bat correctly and hit a moving ball. Children to look at the correct way of holding a bat and names of parts of the cricket bat. Ensure that children are using the blade of the bat to hit the ball. Discuss how to hit the ball into space and avoid hitting the ball towards the opposition.  - Participate in a cricket game following the basic laws of the game. Complete a Kwik Cricket game following the basic rules.
